

The final day of m.i.l.a.p. 2023 began with a panel discussion by H.S. Shivaprakash, Dharmanna Mahaanth and his team on Dissemination of *Bhakti* Arts in Southern India: Past and Present, which was moderated by Prithviraj Kavathur. They discussed the evolution and current state of *Bhakti* culture in urban cities.

The session began with a *Tattvapada* performance after which Shivaprakash spoke about the *Bhakti* tradition. Moreover, he stated that *Bhakti* tradition is based on oral and folk traditions. He concluded by stating that "*Bhakti* is not philosophy but a practice."

She elaborated on how the caste system persists in playing a vital role in society as urbanisation spreads and cities expand. Through her presentation, she highlighted that caste and gentrification remains deeply ingrained in a city like Bengaluru.

The panel discussed social, economic, and spatial inclusion of migrants in Bengaluru. Romal described migrating as not just a phenomenon that takes place due to geographic reasons but also due to economic needs. He went on to state that Bengaluru is a city where its native citizen is indistinguishable because of its inclusivity. Madhu described a migrant to be anyone that resides in an area other than their place of birth. He went on to state that Bengaluru possesses the beauty of experimentation within the city, which is what makes it so unique. Kalpana stated that Bengaluru is an open and safe space for various communities to reside.

Yaksha Durga Mahila Kala Balaga is a Taalamaddale collective, which tries to articulate a distinctly female experience rather than just imitating the male tradition of Yakshagana. Through their performance as a part of m.i.l.a.p. 2023 they presented the possibilities of female voice or gaze in traditional Yakshagana librettos, songs and dialogues.

Kruti R, a farmer, Yakshagana Bhagavatha, a poet, and an independent researcher directed an all-female Taalamaddale troupe. Through her practice of Yakshagana and her poetry, she has tried to examine the relationship of caste and gender to tradition.
