6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

- 6.2.1 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following (with in 100 words each):
- ❖ Curriculum Development: The curriculum of all the program are discussed during the board of studies meetings held twice a year. During the board of studies meeting, feedback on the curriculum is obtained from students and external subject experts on the curriculum. Based on the feedback, necessary corrective actions are initiated after approval. Recently, the institute has adopted outcome-based education and the same is being implemented for the undergraduate program at present. To realize this, a series of discussions and consultations have been organized with experts from the sister institutions and a draft curriculum for the same is prepared and approved
- ❖ Teaching and Learning: Implementation of newer and better teaching-learning methods is one of the yearly objectives of the institution and all the departments at the institution are actively involved in the development and implementation of newer learning methods in the form of case-based learning, e-learning videos, self-directed learning, table clinics, small group discussions, etc. In addition, the institution is upgrading the teaching-learning facilities for conducive learning in a phased manner. This year, lecture capturing system has been installed in two of the lecture halls, and the plan for extending the same to other lecture halls has been approved. In addition, e-learning portal has been made available for the students learning.
- ❖ Examination and Evaluation: Digital examination system through e-exam using e-pad is in place.
- * Research and Development: To facilitate research, the institute has adopted the incentive system of Manipal Academy of Higher Education. The research contribution has been made as part of the performance appraisal system of the faculty.
- ❖ Library, ICT, and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation: Proposals to augment the existing infrastructure for academic learning have been projected in the budget for approval.
- ❖ Human Resource Management: The current staffing pattern of the institute satisfies the statutory requirements. Efforts are being made to recruit suitable staff to the vacant positions
- ❖ Industry Interaction / Collaboration: A number of academic and research collaborations have been explored for general academic cooperation, student and faculty exchange, and for research purposes. A total of 5 collaborations with international universities were signed in this academic year. At present the institution collaborated with Nobel Biocare, a well-known implant industry and is offering a certificate course in Implantology. Similarly, the institution has collaboration with Mayur Davda, Canon Photomentor and offers a certificate program in

Integrated dental photography.
