The term 'Amchi' literally means community medical service in Ladakhi, for those who are selflessly dedicated to support humanitarian

- Awareness programs on AIDS and Cancer among the general public
- School Dental Health Program, oral hygiene day, No tobacco day, Swaach Bharat program are organized
- Varambally village was adopted to make it Tobacco free village
- Conducting free dental screening and tobacco cessation awareness camp for the Auto rickshaw drivers
 of Manipal. The dental check-up was done for around 200 auto rickshaw drivers of Manipal and oral
 prophylaxis was done for free in the mobile dental van
- Oral hygiene awareness camp was organized for the retired policemen in the department of Public Health Dentistry where, the oral screening was done, oral prophylaxis was done and oral hygiene awareness talk was given by Dr Ramprasad, Associate Professor, Department of Public Health Dentistry.
- National Science Day was celebrated by providing oral health check up to school children and giving them free health cards for treatment. The event in which 174 children and 24 teachers from 11 schools in and around Udupi and Manipal took part. The students were educated on the scope of dentistry as a

career opportunity. They were also told about tobacco abuse, awareness on child abuse, oral habits and health care delivered by pedodontists in Pediatric and Preventive dentistry using posters.
